Ashley Armstrong is building a scale Handley Page H.P. 42.

The H.P. 42 was perhaps the greatest symbol of the days when flying was a spectacle and an adventure. It was an imposing design that seemed to be composed entirely of spars, rigging, and engines.

It was this aircraft that Imperial Airways carried the flag to the outposts of the British Empire around the world between the World Wars.

It had a stalling speed of not more than 83 km/h and a range of at least 800 km. It had an all-metal airframe which was fabric covered.

The four engines were Bristol Jupiters. The first completed aircraft was named *Hannibal*.
